THE CONSEQUENCES OF THE PAST YEAR FOR THE YOUNGER GENERATION SHOULD NOT BE UNDERESTIMATED.

Whilst we are all facing the challenges of this pandemic, it has also highlighted that Britain has an appalling social inequality, particularly our young people who often don't get an opportunity to shine.

Whether they face challenges in their family life, through education or any other factor, this pandemic will ultimately hit disadvantaged young people the hardest. But if we are to rebuild society in a better way, young people need to absolutely be at the heart of that recovery.

I believe that recovery of a generation needs to happen post-Covid through participation in exercise and sport. This will help to build their confidence and self-esteem and also their physical health, which we have seen has also been massively impacted. Young people at fee paying schools do three times as much sport and PE as their state school peers. These principles also need to be baked into the school curriculum for every young person. Not just those who can afford it. For every young person. Sport shouldn't be a side issue, confined to the so called ministry of fun. There's nothing fun about the life-long health risks associated with a life of inactivity.

We work day-to-day with some of the most disadvantaged kids in the country and I know having schools closed for months would have had a serious impact on them. Life is about opportunities – you are what you are exposed to - and it's about time we started to expose young people to chances so they can help us recover.

That's why they need us more than ever. Like everyone, we've had it tough this year at RugbyWorks but I believe we come out stronger and more determined than ever to help the young people we support thrive.

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THOUGHTS FROM OUR CHAIR PERSON MATTHEW KEY

What a difference 12 months makes. This time last year I wrote to you about how we were increasing our service to more disadvantaged young people and how we could see further expansion in front of us.

The pandemic was particularly harsh on RugbyWorks as approximately two-thirds of our expected income vanished overnight. We had to cancel all our events we had planned to run through the summer and autumn. This meant we had to take a serious look at our operating model and our cost base as well as how we continued to deliver a product to young people who were probably no longer situated within their school environment.

I am glad to say that we managed to significantly re-engineer the business and through some very generous donors, who accelerated their contributions, have kept a stable financial position.

We were also delighted to have some wonderful Trustees join us during 2019/20 who bring a wealth of expertise in the education and finance sectors. I look forward to working with Zenna Hopson, John D'Abbro and Nicola Hetherington and continuing our excellent work from last year.

Once it became clear that schools would reopen in the 20/21 academic year, we decided to reconfigure the business in such a way that we could continue to deliver to the vast majority of our young people.

This time also gave us an opportunity to reflect on our work in 19/20 and how we could have an even greater impact on the young people we support.

We are now progressing into exciting new fields with our digital delivery service, which has been funded by one of the aforementioned supporters, and with our theory of change, our model is designed to give young people even more skills to thrive.

However, the need for RugbyWorks is greater than ever and we must all endeavour to find a way to positively impact upon as many young people as possible.

I'm sure there will be an end to this period of our history and we will exit an even stronger and more important element in our society. Thank you once again for your continued support. We simply could not do what we do without your help.

MEET VINNIE **USING RUGBYWORKS TO MAKE** A BETTER FUTURE

Vinnie Gardner was 13 when he was kicked out of school. At the time, Vinnie, one of nine siblings, was dealing weed, drinking alcohol, stealing and getting into fights. "I didn't go to lessons, teachers hated me, I was their daily nightmare," he recalled.

When Vinnie arrived at The Pavilion pupil referral unit in north London, he was already, he admitted, "out of control" — but then his father died of alcohol poisoning in the following year and he became even worse.

We started working in The Pavilion the year Vinnie joined the school. At first, Vinnie was not keen to attend. "They played touch rugby which means if someone catches you, it's like a tackle and you have to give them the ball," he said. "I hated being caught. I would swear, 'give me the f***ing ball or I'll punch you'. Nobody stood up to me. But then the RugbyWorks Mentors "I felt angry because my dad was pulled me aside and said, 'we don't

WHAT WE DO

DURING THE 2019/20 ACADEMIC YEAR, WE MADE A BIG CALL TO FOCUS ON HOW WE COULD STRENGTHEN OUR DELIVERY AND ALSO FURTHER DISPLAY HOW OUR WORK IS IMPACTING THE LIVES OF DISENGAGED AND DISADVANTAGED YOUNG PEOPLE ACROSS ENGLAND AND WALES.

To achieve these goals, we started by assessing the major issues facing young people we support and how our engagement can help them to break the cycle and change their lives for the better.

HOW WE HELP CHANGE THE LIVES OF YOUNG PEOPLE

We know that in order for young people to make changes in their lives they need to have authentic, trusted and credible relationships with adults. That's why our squad of Mentors and Sessional Coaches help young people to re-assess their lives by focusing on teaching them valuable life skills which will give them the best chance to succeed in later life through education, employment or training.

Our role is simple. To give these young people, and those on the verge of exclusion, the support they desperately need so they can start to create a pathway which allow them to succeed.

THE ISSUE

We know that the futures of young people who are excluded from school can be significantly affected in comparison to those who are not excluded. 45% of excluded students are not in education, employment or training (NEET) once they leave school and only 5% of excluded students get English and Maths GCSEs.

These young people can also face a huge range of challenging situations and multiple risk factors including coming from low socio-economic groups, living in chaotic households, have barriers to learning, lacking positive role models and living with parents or carers with mental wellbeing challenges, which can all deeply impact the chance of a young person to thrive in later life.

OUR PURPOSE

We exist to help change young people's lives.

OUR VISION

We use the values of rugby, and sport in general, to ensure that disadvantaged young people who are disengaged from learning get the best opportunities to build a positive and productive future.

HOW WE DO IT





We want to give disadvantaged young people the best opportunity of achieving a positive and productive future, and this will only be possible through the ambitions and targets we set for ourselves.



FINANCIAL AND ORGANISATIONAL STRENGTH

Thanks to the hard work of our brilliant squad and Board of Trustees, we are now in an excellent position to grow and prosper.

During 2019/20, we had to make some difficult decisions to ensure that we were in the best possible shape to achieve success and ultimately be there for all the young people we support in the future. We're also addressing how we raise money to ensure that we have a balanced and sustainable outlook.

We've moved away from our events-led funding model so we can have a more robust and secure income strategy.

One aspect of this is that we will be increasing our efforts to raise income from trusts and foundations ensuring we are attracting funding over several years.

We also know that money doesn't grow on trees. That's why, thanks to our partners State Street, we are working towards becoming a fantastic charity partner for a greater range of corporates, which will not only secure our future, but allow us to have a diverse range of corporate partners to lean upon for additional support and guidance.

Alongside this, for the first time we will be introducing school charging for the sessions we deliver in term-time. This will not be on a full-cost recovery basis, meaning schools will still get exceptional value for money and also have a stronger contracting arrangement with us, ensuring they can see the value we bring to their curriculum and their young people.

Our excellent supporters also played a vital role in supporting us through 2019/20 and in return we will be developing a clearer offer to them so they can contribute regularly to our work.



DEEPEN AND BROADEN IMPACT

We know that our support is making a huge impact in the schools we operate in across England and Wales, but we want to show everyone how RugbyWorks is making a life-changing difference to the disadvantaged young people that need us now more than ever.

That means guaranteeing excellence in our delivery across all the interventions we operate in. Working across a range of education institutions with young people that face a myriad of challenges requires our squad to be agile and effective in their support, so they can see the value of our mentors and coaches' guidance. But we also want young people to be at the heart of everything that we do going forward.

We know that their success will be ours, but we also want them to shape their own future with our support. Through working together as a partnership, we can cocreate solutions that will help young people navigate their way through education and into a pathway which will help them transition into adulthood successfully.

This will ultimately help our squad to show the impact we are making on their lives and will be vital in not only displaying our worth to society but also help us to assess where we can strengthen our impact in the future.

We've already deepened our impact in 2019/20 with our work alongside partner organisations who have given our young people invaluable assistance. We know that working together with the likes of Dame Kelly Holmes, England Boxing, Sports Leaders SLQ and others will benefit our young people and will help us to achieve so much more in the future.



EXTEND REACH

Another vital area of our work going forward is extending our reach, so our voice for young people can be heard as far and wide as is possible, but we also want to show how RugbyWorks can play an essential role in giving young people the confidence to succeed.

Our young people are at the heart of everything we do, and we want to give them the platform to tell their story so everyone can understand the challenges they face in the current climate. Sharing their authentic story, including their hopes and dreams, will enable us to not just be an organisation that tells people our delivery is good, but to back it up through the endorsements and stories of our young people.

This in turn will also help us engage with a new audience that are passionate about helping young people in their transition into the adult world. We work with a diverse range of young people but currently that isn't reflected in our supporter base. As much as we're indebted to our brilliant supporters, we'd love to reach new audiences that can contribute to us by reaching new communities and commercial opportunities.

To achieve these aims, we will be strengthening our digital reach both in terms of delivery and communication. Working alongside one of our brilliant partners, we will be introducing a digital delivery service in 2020/21 that will help us to engage young people from afar and mean we can also make a meaningful impact away from the rugby field.

We've also got some exciting plans for our communications channels following our brand refresh which will allow us to engage with a wider audience and extend our reach across England and Wales.
